# President's Annual Report 2016

This report is going to the 57<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting of the Invercargill Contract Bridge Club, and is my last as President. I want to firstly thank the Committee for their support and hard work over the past year, which has certainly had its moments. I have also appreciated the quiet words of appreciation that I have received from members, from time-to-time. It is those small comments of affirmation that mean so much.

# Club Upgrade:

Although not a major year from a fundraising perspective, the club has continued with the upgrade programme that was commenced a few years ago. This year, the most apparent step forward has been the installation of the automatic doors into the club rooms. It is a small thing, but has so many benefits for all club members. It has also allowed us to provide greater security over our assets, with the development of a key register and knowing who has what keys. The internal doors were recently removed, but will be replaced, until a decision is taken as to whether or not to install a second set of automatic doors.

At the same time we have upgraded the foyer with the installation of LED lighting. A small change, but it has made quite a significant difference to the light in that area, particularly in the winter months, and will make a small saving on our electricity accounts into the future.

We have also purchased a new dealing machine for the club – as the old machine was no longer able to be serviced, and was causing problems from time-to-time. This is not something that all club members will be aware of, but it is a benefit to all who play here. It forms part of the technology refresh that is also occurring, as the club is looking to upgrade its computing equipment as well, so that we can take advantage of the technological advances that come along. Although we haven't quite got the new computer system in place yet, it is hoped this will be with us shortly, and make the operation of some of the background work that is done go that much smoother than it has been.

We have also suffered some misfortunes this year – we had a leak in the newly refurbished women's toilet that lead to flooding, resulting in bucketing water over several hours, and then a significant drying out of and subsequent cleaning of carpets being required. In many ways we were lucky we caught it when we did, or the damage could have been much more extensive than it was. Luckily insurance was able to be accessed to meet a large majority of the costs associated with this incident, and the silver lining from that was that the carpets came up looking like new.

We have also made some changes to the electricity coming into the building such that we should see some cost savings coming through on a monthly basis on our electricity accounts. However, shortly after that occurred, we had problems with the car park lighting and the exterior lighting which resulted in some costs with trenching work, and tracking down the problems and correcting them. These sorts of maintenance costs we have not had to face for some time, and they were hard to swallow, when we have been trying to fundraise. However, they are a reality when you are dealing with installations that have been in place for many years.

At the same time we had novaflow installed to assist with the high water table in the grassy area to the north of the club. Hopefully all of this work will see us in good stead into the future.

# Membership:

Jill McMeeking ran another successful group of Learners Classes this year. Although it started off with quite a sizeable bunch at the outset, as we know, there are always some who fall by the way side, realising the game is not for them, or they just don't have the time to take it on at this stage. However, we had six new members come out of Learners classes and join the Silver Reserve grade – which is a positive.

We would love to have more, of course – but as with many other clubs across the country, declining memberships are becoming a reality. We therefore need to ensure that we keep all new members that do come through from the Learner Classes.

It is a constant battle – the older we get the less tolerant we are of others errors. But we all need to remember that we too were once learners. Growling, snapping, or sarcastic comments do not help to improve anybody's play – and that applies to the Silver players as much as the Silver Reserve players. We are all trying to do our best at the time of the bidding and playing of cards. We all forget things and make errors. And as we grow and progress I know I have cringed as I remember some of the really dumb things I did when I first came into the main playing room.

Also, when you know there are learners who have graduated into the main playing room – please, make an effort and ask them to play. They feel intimidated asking current club members in the initial stages – even ringing the Convenor can be a big ask for some. It is much easier for us as established members, to contact them. So please do try your best to be pleasant and assist newcomers, and help us to grow our club, for the benefit of us all.

In particular I want to recognise the work done by Sue Scott, who is this year retiring after undertaking the secretarial duties for the past 10 years. Sue does much more than just the Secretarial duties require, and will be sorely missed on the Committee.
