Whats' the best way to play this hand? - according to Vil Gravis

East is in 6 H with no opposition to bidding

South leads the Space Ace. If you do what most people do, and that is to immediately draw trumps, your contract will depend on a successful club finesse; the only way to finesse is to play the king first lead lead to the jack. But if you have drawn all the trumps, noting the 4-0 breal, even if the club finesse works, the clubs still need to be 3-3 or you will still lose a club.

You could hope for the king of spades to fall in two more rounds. That is the case but after ruffing two spades declarer would fail against a 4-0 trump break.

There is a far easier way to make this slam, as long as there are no really bad breaks in the minor suits.

Win the diamond king after the switch, discard a CLUB on the ace of diamonds, and then proceed on a fairly simple cross ruff; starting with taking the top clubs then a diamond ruff with the TWO. As long as the diamonds are no worse than 6-3 this will not be over-ruffed. You then have a dead set thing in cross ruffing the clubs and spades with your top trumps.

Tip: Always think before you draw any trumps and work out a plan. Learn some basic statistics about chances of suits breaking. Use your trumps wisely and don't just draw trumps immediately just because you have been taught to draw trumps.
