## COMBINATIONS PROVIDING MORE THAN A 50% CHANCE OF SUCCESS

## FIVE TIPS ON SUIT COMBINATIONS

- Use Declarer's Plan. Assess the Situation. Know how many tricks you need or how many losers you can afford.
- 2. If you need more tricks, browse Declarer's Checklist. Combine chances, taking the losses early whenever possible
- 3. Be aware of suit combinations that provide more than a 50% chance of success.
- Avoid leading a high card if you can't afford to have it covered. Play a high card when it will increase the chance of success.
- Don't make a play you know isn't going to work. It is often advantageous to have the opponents lead a suit for you.


An even number of missing cards tend to divide slightly unevenly; an odd number of missing cards tend to divide as evenly as possible.

## **TIPS FOR LEADS:**

- Never lead an unsupported Ace or underlead it on the opening lead against a trump contract.
- Confucius say: "declarer and defender lead same suit, one of them crazy".





## EXTRACT FROM 'TIPS AND QUIPS CONTRACT BRIDGE BY VAL GRAVIS

Our bridge club has purchased this new book which I have read and I thought there was some great hints:

- ⇒ With 4441 hand, never open in the major, always
  in a minor and decide on your rebid before you do.
- ⇒ Many 4441 hands are good to play if you have a fit in one of your suits and can embark on a cross ruff.

## What to bid with this hand?

West opens 1C and East responds 1S, now what does West rebid? Gravis suggests it would be best to bid 2C otherwise a diamond or heart bid may be considered a reverse bid.

Bidding the minor first then allows partner to hopefully bid one of the majors.

## WELCOME TO "WHAT I TEACH AND WHY PT 2" BY KRISTEN COLLINS

### **Reverses**

Why do I teach reverses? Reverses are an integral part of a basic ACOL system. I admit it is a tricky part :)

Opener's second bid should clarify their hand by putting it into either the 12-15 HCP or 16-19 HCP range. It should also try to show 1 of 3 shapes (4/4/4/1 shaped hands are problematic and cannot be fully described in 2 bids - there is always an exception to the rule):

a balanced hand: either opening 1NT or rebidding NT

An unbalanced hand with the longer suit of higher rank than the shorter: ♠ KQ986 **V**AT94 **•** A9 **\*** 87 Opener has a 1S opening with a 2H rebid. Showing 5+2 & 4+2 and 12-15 HCP, ♠ KQ986 ♥ AK94 **A**9 **Å** 17 Opener has a 1S opening with a jump shift to a 3H rebid. Showing 5+2 & 4+2 and 16-19 HCP An unbalanced hand with the longer suit of lower rank than the shorter - this is where reverses come into play. ♠ 85 Hand 1: 🕈 AK94 **98** KQ986 vs Hand 2: ▲ A5 **V**AK94 **8**L **♦** ♣ KO986 In both instances Opener opens 1C and Responder bids 1S. How does Opener show the very big HCP difference between hand 1 and hand 2 with their second bid?

What we need to think about is: where will this bidding sequence end?

Imagine Responder has:  $\clubsuit$  K742  $\clubsuit$  J32  $\diamondsuit$  Q76  $\clubsuit$  754

If the bidding proceeds 1C - 1S - 2H Responder is forced to prefer Opener's first suit at the 3 level by bidding 3C.

Look at Hand 1 and Responders hand above, do you want to try to make 9 tricks in Clubs with these two hands?

The basic rule of a reverse is: <u>to be able to bid that second higher ranking suit</u> **at the 2 level** Opener must <u>be in the 16-19 HCP range.</u>

This seems counter intuitive, we have two suits and we want to be able to show both but in this instance the price of forcing the bidding into the 3 level is too high. Opener needs 16-19 to have any chance of making 9 tricks. Opener must have the extra power in their hand to support the partnership at the 3 level.

So the bidding with Hand 1 will go: 1C - 1S - 2C, showing 5+ C and 12-15 HCP. If Responder has hearts and/ or points for game they will take charge of the auction.

The bidding on Hand 2 will go: 1C - 1S - 2H, showing 5+C & 4+H and 16-19 HCP.

## **NESTING PAIRS**

This is a new trial that we thought you might be interested in. It is a great resource for smaller clubs who do not hold advanced lessons. Some players are choosing to attend just part of the course - concerned it may to be advanced – this is fine – just have a go—you might learn something. You need to do this in conjunction with a partner to be most effective.
