News from Annual General Meeting:

- Thanks to the 38 members who turned up the AGM on Monday 7th November. This was a huge improvement on previous years (2015: 20, 2014 18) so maybe having the AGM before play works.
- Welcome to Eve Beardsmore as the new president, Jenny Magee as Vice President, Joan Robertson as Treasurer and Jen Macartney as a general committee member.
- Many thanks to the out-going committee members. Judy Robertson has been our treasurer for 15+ years. Donna Ruwhiu is also going off committee as Past President. A big thank you to both of these people for all the extra work they have put in.
- As mentioned last month the proposed changes to rules have been accepted. Look out for the new document on our website under resources. The main change is that visitors may only play 3 times in any one year before they will be asked if they would like to join as members.
- The Club is in good financial health and made a \$2K profit (up from \$858 previous year). Of interest to note is that 50% of our income comes from table money (up 3% from previous year, although table money was increased), 18% from subscriptions, 10% from Bar sales and 10% from Tournament income. Overall our total expenses have remained static from last year.

News from the Committee

- 100% turn-out for the new committee which was a very positive start.
- There is planned maintenance required for the roof and spouting.
- Well done to Jen Macartney who was mentioned in the Masterpoints Reports as receiving a Novice award.
- The following motions were put forward and agreed to:
 - That only members ranked Junior Grading, as per NZ Bridge will be eligible to win Junior Championships, The Beryl Bishop Trophy, The Mabel Porteous Trophy and The Three Night Individual Trophy.

Champ Pairs Final

Why sit the top 6 pairs NS?

Fact 1: In contract bridge playing a Mitchell Movement, players are only scored against those playing the same way – usually half the pairs present. To be fair, if we want the top players to be scored against one another, they must all sit in the same direction and so playing the same hands.

Fact 2: When there are feed-ins, there is always a switch. If there is a phantom some players get it once and some twice. For example if there are 10½ tables and we play 26 boards some pairs play 26 boards, some 24, and some only 22. So that top contenders play the same hands, then they must all be siting the same way and that is the same way as the phantom. (They all get the same 26 hands)

The situation can be complicated by players having sitting rights. Normally it wouldn't matter whether the top contenders are all sitting NS or EW except that if one of the top contenders has sitting rights then the others must sit NS as well.

Is that clear? Probably not, unless you are clear that it is more important who you are scored against rather than whom you are playing against!

Improve your Bridge

If you are a **beginner** or wish to **improve** your bridge, are you aware of, or have you looked at the resources available on the NZBridge web site? Did you know?

Law 7 says that when a board is to be played it is placed in the centre of the table until play is completed. This does not mean you need get out a tape measure, but you should not be moving the board away over to the side. Sometimes people with vision problems need the dummy close to them and may need to move the board back to make room for this, but on the whole there is plenty of room for dummy to be spread and the board to remain near enough to the centre. Players should be able to see the vulnerability and dealer at all times. Placing the bidding pad on top of the board is a bad habit.
