Noel Kerr was a great supporter of the Club in the 1970's, long before our current clubrooms were built. When the Club was starting bridge was played in various locations including people's homes, the Palisander Lounge (the Mitre 10 building today), the Taieri Bowling Club and for a small group above Noel Kerr's pharmacy (organised by Alison, Noel's wife). Noel was a very skilled bridge player who readily shared his knowledge with others. He took lessons and provided guidance to players before bridge on a Wednesday.

SOME REMINDERS ABOUT ALERTING...

This is where a player circles his partner's bid as soon as partner has written it to let the opposition know that the bid has a meaning different from that which they might expect.

- Any bid that means something other than what it says has to be alerted. (An exception to this is 2C, showing clubs, in response to a 1NT opening bid. This is because 2C is more commonly used as an artificial bid or convention to show a major.)
- There are some common bids that do not require alerts because they are so well-known. E.g. opening a strong 2C, or a bid of 2C over partners 1NT which is stayman.
- If in doubt, alert.
- If a bid is alerted, it pays to ask the partner of the player who made the bid what it means, when it's your turn to bid.
- The appropriate question to ask is "What is your agreement (about the meaning of that bid)?" not "What do you take that as?" If you have no agreement, say "Undiscussed". Do not provide a guess about what you think your partner means.
- When asked the meaning of the alerted bid, full disclosure is the rule (length and strength). Players are entitled to know the exact meaning of the opposition's bid in order for them to bid accurately themselves.
- You are not allowed to volunteer an explanation of your alert. It could be construed as giving info to your partner. If the opposition wants to know, they must ask.

FROM THE ARCHIVES 40 YEARS AGO...

The Taieri Bridge Club held a Special Meeting on 20 November 1985, a motion was put to the Club that members refrain from smoking cigarettes, pipes and cigars in the Bridge Room before supper on Club nights, before afternoon tea when play is in the afternoon, and before lunch when play commences at 10.30am. The motion was carried 64 being in favour and 27 against!

TIPS FOR WHEN TO FINESSE:

- "Eight ever, nine never"...
- * This means if you have an 8 card suit between you and dummy then odds are it is better to finesse, whereas with 9 cards it is generally best to hope for the drop..
