LEADING QUESTIONS IN BRIDGE by Sally Brock

I always think that the leading card can make or break a contract so I thought I would investigate this a bit further.

To start off you should always listen to the bidding as this may give you a few clues on whether you will be active or passive. An active lead is where you lead from honours hoping to promote your side's defensive tricks before declare has established sufficient tricks of his own. Unfortunately this can sometimes set up winners for declarer that he would not have otherwise have.

A passive defence simply tries to avoid giving declarer any tricks that are not his by rights. You should make this kind of lead when you are defending from strength. This too has it's problems as it can sometimes allow declarer to set up



his own tricks before the defense's tricks are established.

Should I lead "4th Highest of my longest and Strongest"? This is great a great lead for No trumps especially if opponents have bid your longest suit. If you lead this way you can use the "Rule of 11", subtract the pips from the card lead from 11 then this will tell you the number of cards in the other three hands that are higher than the one led.

Example where South has bid 1 NT and West leads the 7 spades. 11 minus 7 = 4. As East you have 3 cards higher than 7 in your hand and 1 in the dummy then you can tell that declarer does not have a card higher than 7.

If you have a very weak hand that you have no prospect of developing then you should try to find partner's suit and not lead your 4th card of your longest suit.

Should I Lead Partner's suit? Often this is a good idea as your partner should be showing you that they hold length and values and they want you to lead that suit if you have the opportunity. Sometimes this is not always the correct thing to do. For example if your partner was just replying to your bid and you ended up defending, chances are your partner is only showing 4 cards so there is no point leading it.

You as West hold ***** 9854 ***** Q J 1074 ***** J 5

Bidding went East 1C, South 1NT, West pass, North 3 NT, all pass. Should you lead the Jack of Clubs rather than leading your own 5 card suit. As you don't have an outside entry into your hand you should lead partner's bid suit.

Steer away from partner's suit:

When he hasn't shown a good suit (no overcall)

When you think it will give the opponents their game-going trick.

When the opponents have bid a slam confidently after partner has bid a suit.

Should I lead the Unbid Suit? Often this is good because opponents have already bid their long suits and this will generally be where the majority of their high cards will be. If the unbid suit is a major and declarer could have bid it easily, it is unlikely that either opponent has more than 3 cards in it, so unless you have a better alternative bid the unbid suit.

As a good alternative you could bid dummy's second bid as it is likely to be shorter than the first suit.

Lead the unbid suit

Against no trump when declarer can't hold four cards in it

Against a suit contract when you have the Ace and the King of a suit

When they arrived at No trump very slowly

When the are in a suit contract they have arrived at and it is clear that they have no great fit.

Steer away from the unbid suit

When declarer has jumped to game in no trump When both opponents are likely to have length in the unbid suit When you are weak in the unbid suit, but have a reasonable 5 card suit to lead instead When a lead of that suit risks setting up too many tricks for declarer.
