#### Health



This is not fair to anyone who attends, never mind our older and more vulnerable members. If you do come to bridge in this state, you should expect to be sent home.

#### **Director's Corner**

This month a reminder regarding Law 31. the Bid out of Rotation, since it is occurring at almost session. If, say before East bids, South bids 1H, do not cross out the 1H bid and carry on regardless. Whatever East bids, South then has to make a "comparable" call, ie one that has a similar meaning to their original call. If, for instance East were to bid 1S, then South would have to bid 2H. If South bids anything else, then North has to pass when it is their turn to bid. In any case, as soon as the bid out of turn is made, call the Director.

#### Don't Need the Answer? Don't Ask the Question.

In this hand from a recent Friday afternoon session my partner and I were seated NS and quickly landed in 6NT, one of four pairs to bid the lay-down slam:



Our auction was short and direct:

#### **East South West North**

Pass 1D Pass 2C

Pass 2NT Pass 6NT

All Pass

South's 2NT rebid shows a balanced 15-17 HCP so with 17 HCP North has no good reason to bid anything other than 6NT. On a bad day the 6-8 points held by EW will include two aces but this is possible only if South has exactly 15 HCP, and the 8 points in the EW hands do not include a king, queen, or jack. As the cards lie the slam is a lay-down: West leads a small club, finessed by declarer in the hope that West has under-led the king, and when East's king wins can immediately claim 12 tricks: the club ace, five tricks in diamonds and three in each of the majors.

Why not cover all possible bases and check for the remote possibility that NS are missing two aces? After South's 2NT an immediate 4C by North would be Gerber, with South responding 4NT to show three. North could continue with 5C to ask for kings but there is little point in doing so: with at most 34 HCP even if the partnership holds all the aces and kings there will surely be a hole in the bucket somewhere and 6NT is likely to be the limit.

But the counter-argument is that any ace-ask, regardless of whether you use Gerber, Blackwood, or RKB, gives the opponents the opportunity to make a *lead-directing double*. The response to any ace-ask is always conventional and says nothing about responder's holding in the bid suit. If the bidding side is heading for NT a double of an ace-ask response shows a promising holding in that suit (such as KQJ) and asks partner to lead the suit at the first opportunity. And if the bidding side is heading for a trump contract a double by the player not on lead shows a void, asking partner to lead that suit so they can collect a first-round ruff. Such doubles are rare but can be deadly when they occur, and are well worth adding to your bidding arsenal.
