Transfers 201: Part 1

Jacoby Transfers – or more commonly just transfers – are a convention used by responder to show a five-card major suit after partner has opened a natural 1NT. The basic idea is that responder shows his major by bidding the suit immediately below: thus 2D shows 5+ hearts, and 2H shows 5+ spades. This is forcing for one-round, asking opener to respond by bidding the suit implicitly shown by the transfer: 2H in response to 2D, and 2S in response to 2H.

Many club partnerships play transfers, but limit their use to just one situation: when responder is weak and wishes to sign off at the two level. In such cases transfers have the virtue that opener becomes declarer, so that the stronger hand remains hidden.

But transfers can do more than that: much more. If transfers are part of your system but you use them only as a weak takeout, you are like someone who sits down to a seven course meal and leaves after the appetiser. In this series of articles, we'll look at some of the later courses on the transfer menu.

(1) Invitational raises

A fairly common hand type is where responder has invitational values (e.g., 11-12 points opposite a 12-14 1NT opening) and a 5-card major. For example:



Game is likely to be on if partner is maximum, but the optimum contract is unclear. 3NT will be best if opener has only two hearts, but if opener has three (or more) hearts 4H is likely to be safer. So how does the partnership explore these options?

Many responders resort to the familiar Stayman on such hands, but this is the wrong tool for the job. With eight hearts distributed among the remaining three hands opener will hold three of them 31% of the time, but will have four just 17% of the time. Using Stayman merely forces opener to respond 2D 83% of the time, squandering a round of bidding without leaving the partnership any closer to locating a much more likely 5-3 fit. Stayman fails because it asks rather than tells: instead of **asking** opener for a 4-card major, responder needs to **tell** opener that he has a 5-card major.

On the hand above responder begins by bidding 2D (which must be alerted), promising 5+ hearts and asking opener to bid 2H in response. The transfer says nothing about responder's point count, so that opener does not yet know partner's strength. However – thanks to the switch of tempo created by the transfer – responder now has the opportunity to clarify his hand by making another bid. A second bid of 2NT describes responder's hand with pinpoint accuracy: an invitational raise to 2NT with a 5-card heart suit. Opener can then set the final contract with complete confidence:

he or she passes with a doubleton heart and a minimum;

bids 3H (to play) with three hearts and a minimum;

bids 3NT with a doubleton heart and a maximum;

or 4H with three hearts and a maximum.

So that takes care of the soup. Next month we'll move on to the entree, and consider game-going raises.
