
#### **Tables**

## A tricky slam

A deal from a recent Friday afternoon session provided N/S a chance to bid and make a small slam on a combined 28 points. At our table N/S ended in the rather ambitious contract of 6H after North opened 1H and rebid 2H after South's temporising response of 2C.



East led the diamond three, giving declarer an easy run. Faced with three possible losers – a spade, a diamond, and a club – she wins the opening lead in hand, draws trumps, finesses East's diamond King, discards her losing spade on the diamond Ace, and concedes a club to bring home 12 tricks. A club lead fares no better: declarer plays low from dummy to snare West's King, takes the diamond finesse, and has only a spade to lose.

A spade or heart lead gives nothing away, making it much harder for declarer. Win the spade lead and draw trumps, ending in dummy. Play the club Queen, and – when this holds, marking West with the King – switch to the heart Jack. Follow with the ten, overtaken in hand with the Queen, to reach the following seven card ending:

If East holds both the diamond King and the club ten, the contract is now home. Play the last two hearts from hand, and note East's discards. If he throws a diamond, you will make three diamond tricks and the club Ace, conceding a spade at the end. If he throws a club, take the diamond finesse and play the club Jack to score two diamonds and two clubs. And if he throws his spades, follow with the diamond Queen. East will cover with the King, taken by dummy's Ace. after which you cash the diamond Jack and exit with your last diamond, throwing East in and forcing him to lead away from his club tenace.

Essentially the same plays are available to declarer if the defence kicks off with a heart lead, or if the hand is played in 6NT rather than 6H. But with a ten card trump fit most pairs opted for a heart contract, chalking up anywhere from ten to thirteen tricks depending on the quality of declarer's guesswork.
