Supported online play is like having a friend at the table, offering support whenever you need it. Imagine it's like using Zoom; you can see and talk to each other while playing cards, and with an experienced player available to offer advice or answer questions.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW:

- The first session on 8th June is a FREE taster session.
- Sign up to Hello Club, upload funds then select these sessions.
- Each week you will be sent an email with a link to a RealBridge game.
- Log in by 3.45pm on Sundays. Games start at 4pm.
- We recommend that you play on a computer/laptop.
- If you have a Club Number, use this as your ID. If you don't have a number, use your Club Name.
- This is a great opportunity for players in their first and second year.
- Each session will be 120 minutes.



If you put your name forward for this, please let the Club know at <u>wanakabridgeclub@fastmail.com</u>, If you already have a regular partner, try to get them involved, too. Ideally, organise a four between yourselves.

Given that the sessions go on for over three months this year, I cannot guarantee my availability every week . If anyone else can help, even for a few sessions, let me know.

Director's Corner

We have a reminder about bridge etiquette on the table number cards. As there have been a few, shall we say, differences of opinion on the subject recently, it is time to talk instead about procedure. Each of the players at the table has individual responsibilities to keep the game moving and accurately recorded.

Start by tossing a coin to see who sits where. South operates the tablet which records the scores and the players' identities. Once South has entered the score for a hand. the tablet is presented to East for verification. As long as everyone is in agreement, East taps the screen and returns it to South.

West is responsible for moving the boards just played to the table that they are destined for according to the movement being used. These are normally placed on the side table next to North, who puts the first hand to be played on the table, ensuring the the board is correctly oriented. After the board has been played, it is up to each player to put all of their cards back in the appropriate sleeve.

This does not sound particularly onerous, but there is much to think about during a bridge session and mistakes are made. The directors and computer operators would be very grateful if you could follow these procedures a little more carefully.

Two Clubs Or Not 2 Clubs?

Most Wanaka players use an opening 2C bid to show a strong hand but the subsequent bidding is often confused. The requirements for a 2C opening are well described in <u>Lesson 10, the last of New Zealand Bridge's beginner</u> <u>lessons</u>**. The relevant definitions are that opener shows either (1) 20+ HCP in a distributional hand; or (2) 23+ HCP in a balanced hand. A more recent refinement, introduced by NZBridge in 2024, is based on the "Rule of 28": a 2C opening on a hand where the total HCP and the number of cards in the two longest suits equals or exceeds 28 conforms to this definition and is not alertable.

The other defining characteristic of a 2C opening is that it is *game-forcing*. Responder must bid even with no points at all, and – with one exception – *both partners must continue bidding until game is reached*. The sole exception is when opener rebids 2NT, showing a balanced hand with 23-24 HCP, allowing responder to pass with 0-1 HCP. Any other rebid by opener – 2H, 2S, 3C, 3D – is forcing to game.

The second round of the Monday evening Roy Stakes on 12th May was notable for this deal highlighting the wide variation in how the 2C opening is played.

The auction at our table was:

South West North East

Pass 2C 2H Pass

Yet the results for this deal show that only six of the eleven EW pairs bid to game. It's hard to imagine West opening anything other than 2C with a "Rule of 28" count of 33 or rebidding anything other than 3D on the second round. Pairs who opted for NT may have been guilty of bad judgement, lured by the extra points for a NT contract, but at least they were in game. It's much harder to justify East's decision to pass 3D given that it's 100% game-forcing, and even harder to understand why one West player was sufficiently intimidated by North's 2H overcall that they did not bid again.

It appears that 5 of 11 – almost half – of the EW pairs who encountered this deal do not play a 2C opening on an unbalanced hand as game forcing. This is five too many. Opening 2C is specifically designed to allow opener to game-force regardless of partner's strength, and should be an essential part of your bidding toolkit.
