Clock

Director's Corner

At a recent Monday session, the Director was called to a table where declarer

had asked for a card to be played from dummy and then changed their mind.

The Director had to consult Law 45: "Card Played". The relevant part is 45 C 4 (b), which reads as follows:


"Declarer may correct an unintended designation of a card from dummy until he next plays a card from either his own hand or from dummy, A change in designation may be allowed after a slip of the tongue, but not after a loss of concentration or a reconsideration of action. If an opponent has, in turn played a card that was legal before the change in designation, that opponent may withdraw the card so played, return it to his hand, and substitute another".

The first two sentences above are confusing, and almost appear self-contradictory so Director was none the wiser having consulted the Rule Book. A consultation with Mary, Christensen, our local Tournament Director has cleared this up to an extent. When declarer nominates a card from dummy, it is equivalent to any other player laying down a card. If declarer has done this after a "slip of the tongue", then he is allowed to play the second card nominated. If it for any other reason, then he must play the first card.

The Director is supposed to work this out by asking the declarer what they meant to say. Any declarer that knows this Law will say that it was a slip of the tongue. Mary tends to side with the declarer, anyway, presumably because the Law is so badly written!

Loveblock Games

The Loveblock Pairs, played on 17th October, has a reputation for weird and highly distributional hands. Here's one of them:



The auction at our table was

South West North East

Pass 1C X XX

Pass 3C Pass 3NT

Pass 5C Pass 6C

All pass

East's first round redouble denies club support but shows at least 10 HCP, giving EW the additional option of a low-level penalty double if NS end up playing the contract. With both West and North showing opening values East knows South can't have more than 1-2 HCP. However West has no interest in defending and bids 3C, which East converts to 3NT. With just two queens outside the club suit, one of which is a singleton, West presses on to 5C.

The Loveblock deal commentary notes that "bidding dubious slams is rarely a successful part of Pairs bridge" and recommends that West should pass 3NT. However, 5C puts East on the spot. West clearly has at least a 7- or 8-card suit headed by the AK if not the AKQ, and may have little if anything outside the trump suit to serve as an entry. East should also consider that if West does not hold the club queen there is still about a 40% chance it will fall in two rounds, and that – if the worst comes to the worst and one defender holds Qxx in clubs – 5C rather than 3NT will score well below average when 3NT makes. Recalling Paul Marston's advice that "if your gut feeling is that slam will make, bid it" East pressed on to 6C.

As the cards lie both 6C and 6NT are unbeatable. North led the heart ace and – after drawing trumps in two rounds – West was able to claim at trick four. Of the 13 tables one other EW pair bid 6NT to earn a 100% top, leaving us to claim 92% for a 2nd top.
