

Think before you play

The following deal, from the second night of the Pembroke Pairs, illustrates the importance of thinking before you play to the first trick:



With South holding 24 points N-S were never going to stop short of game, either in hearts or no trumps depending on their system. Eleven tricks is the limit in no trumps but – with care – twelve tricks can be made in hearts.

At our table, with E-W silent throughout, the auction was:

South	North
2C	2D
2NT	3D
3H	3NT
4H	

South's 2NT rebid showed a balanced 23-24 pts, 3D was a transfer showing 5+ hearts, and 3NT invited South to choose between game in hearts or no trumps. With AKT of hearts and only K4 in diamonds South naturally opted for 4H. One pair bid the slam, but 4H making six would still have earned a good score.

Avoiding the temptation to lead a black suit, which hands declarer 12 tricks on a platter, West found the best lead of the diamond 9. When declarer played low from dummy, East thought for a few seconds before also playing low. If South held the diamond King, as was likely given the auction, playing the Ace would give declarer three diamond tricks.

Given an even trump break South could now count eleven tricks on top: two spades, five hearts, two diamonds, and two clubs. However, exactly the same eleven tricks are available in no trumps, so that – to outscore pairs playing in no trumps – South needed the overtrick.

His best chance is to finesse West for the heart Jack, and ruff a diamond in hand before drawing the last trump. After winning the diamond King, cash the heart Ace and then run the ten. When it holds, lead the diamond four towards dummy. East wins with the Ace, but that is the last trick for the defence. A diamond return lets declarer ruff with the King, cash two rounds of either black suit, and ruff a third round in dummy before drawing the last trump and cashing his remaining winners. If East returns either black suit, declarer crosses to dummy with a third round ruff, ruffs his losing diamond in hand, and also claims twelve tricks.

At the table declarer missed this line of play and had to settle for eleven tricks, earning no more than an average score. By defending correctly at trick one and giving declarer a chance to go wrong, E-W had gained parity despite N-S bidding to a superior contract.
