Teams

Neil Marshall attended our last committee meeting to discuss the future of the Teams format which has been so successful this year. The following was decided:

Next year each team will consist of three Silver and three Bronze players. If necessary, substitutes will be drawn from a pool of available members. This year's top two teams will have to include at least one new Silver player out of the three.

Some members did not organise a team in time for this year's competition. There will be no limit on the number of teams next year. It is possible that there will be two sections, each of, say seven teams, with play-offs at the end of the year.

There will continue to be no C points awarded. We are keeping it as a fun competition with a trophy to be awarded at prizegiving.

Book

Health and Safety Incident Booklet


In the event of any health and safety incidents, a booklet will be available in the office to record them.

Director's Corner

A reminder of the right way to claim. If you think that you are bound to win a certain number of the remaining tricks in a hand, you are allowed to claim. When you do, you must give an explanation of why that number of tricks is inevitable. The opponents are allowed to dispute your claim, so you should be certain of your reasoning. All of the cards will be laid out, and a detailed analysis will be made. If you have forgotten, for instance that a trump is still out, then a potential play where that trump makes a trick may be available. In this case, the Director will award that trick to the opposition. The phrase "reasonable line of play" is used. If, however for instance you have A, K and J of trumps as your last three cards and the Q is still out, then the Director will assume that you will cover the Q with the K or ruff high and then draw the Q. In this case, your claim stands.

To Double or not to Double?

This hand from a recent Friday afternoon session featured a spectacular deal with a freakish distribution:



I didn't play in the session so am not party to the various auctions which occurred but it's hard to criticise an immediate opening bid of 5D by East.

Opening 4D doesn't do the hand justice and leaves room for an enterprising

South to intervene with 4NT, a super-charged version of an Unusual 2NT overcall showing at least 5-5 in the two lowest unbid suits.

As it is, 5D gives South plenty to think about. To double or not to double? At six of the nine tables South passed, no doubt swayed by the prospect that East was likely to have voids or singletons with no guarantee that she would be able to cash two winners let alone three. At the other three tables South doubled for penalties. Unfortunately for NS, the contract is bullet proof. With declarer's heart void and West's spade queen the defense can make only two club tricks before declarer wins any continuation, draws trumps, and claims 11 tricks.
